World Milk Day Celebration at IDA House



World Milk Day

The Indian Dairy Association (IDA) in association with IDA North Zone and Western UP Chapter of IDA celebrated World Milk Day on June 1, 2025 at IDA Head Office. The Chief Guest of the function was Dr. Raghavendra Bhatta, DDG (Animal Science), ICAR, New Delhi.

Dr. Raghavendra Bhatta is a doctorate in veterinary science with a specialisation in Animal Nutrition from Veterinary College, Bangalore. He had an excellent academic career bagging gold medals both in master's and doctorate programmes. During his tenure as the Director, ICAR-NIANP, he developed many state-of-theart infrastructure facilities at NIANP, such as the Centre for Laboratory Animal Research, and the Centre for Climate Resilient Animal Adaptation Studies. Recognising the contribution, the institute was bestowed with the Sardar Patel Outstanding Institute Award in 2021. He is the recipient of several research awards.

Dr. Bimlesh Mann, ADG (E.P. & H.S.), ICAR was the Special Guest. She is also a CEC member of IDA and Editor, Indian Journal of Dairy Science. Dr. S.K. Bhalla, Ex-COO, Mother Dairy was the Guest of Honour. Shri Pankaj Kumar Sharma, Ex-CRO, Mother Dairy and SEC Member of Western UP Chapter of IDA was invited for a Special address on the occasion.

The program started with the ceremonial lighting of lamp on the auspicious occasion. Shri Ram Chandra Choudhary presented a bouquet to the Chief Guest Dr. Raghavendra Bhatta. Other dignitaries Dr. Bimlesh Mann, Dr. S.K. Bhalla and Shri Pankaj Kumar Sharma were also felicitated with a bouquet.



In his Welcome address, **Shri Hariom Gulati**, Secretary General, IDA welcomed the Chief Guest and all other dignitaries attended the World Milk Day event. Speaking about the World Milk Day, he said, it was initiated by FAO in 2001. We used to organize this event to give a tribute to the immense contributions made the Indian dairy sector for the livelihood of small and marginal dairy farmer as well as nutritional security of the country besides empowering rural women connected with dairy sector.

Dr. R.S. Sodhi, President-IDA delivered the Keynote address virtually from Anand, extending a warm



welcome and expressing gratitude to Dr. Raghavendra Bhatta, DDG (Animal Science), ICAR, for joining the event as Chief Guest. He also welcomed all participants for their presence on this significant occasion.

Dr. Sodhi highlighted India's remarkable progress in the dairy sector. From contributing just 6% to global milk production five decades ago, India now contributes 25%, making it the largest milk producer in the world. Over the last decade alone, India has increased its milk output by an amount equivalent to the entire annual milk production of the United States. Projections suggest that in the next ten years, India may add another 185 million metric tonnes (MMT) of milk-equal to the current milk production of the European Union and New Zealand combined.

Dr. Sodhi emphasized the four foundational pillars of India's dairy success:

Small and Marginal Farmers: Over 80 million smallholders with 2-3 animals have adopted dairying as a livelihood. Their commitment and investment in livestock maintenance have been crucial.

Dairy Industry: Beginning with cooperatives and the establishment of the National Dairy Development Board (NDDB), the "Anand Pattern" was replicated across states. The private sector also followed suit, complementing the cooperative model.

Research and Education Institutions: Academic and research bodies have played a key role in enhancing milk production while adapting to India's low-input, low-output system.

Government Support: The Government of India has safeguarded the sector from cheap imports, ensuring sustainability and profitability for dairy farmers.

Dr. Sodhi reiterated that milk is both a nutrition source and a tool for economic empowerment, especially in rural India. India is perhaps the happiest nation celebrating World Milk Day, given its leadership in the sector. The per capita milk availability has increased from 111 grams/day in 1973 to 471 grams/day today.

Urban households spend an average of Rs. 17.50/day on milk and milk products-out of a total daily food expenditure of Rs. 87-underlining dairy's importance in everyday nutrition.

While speaking on the challenges, Dr. Sodhi apprised the participants about some of the important challenges as under:

Feed and Fodder Shortage: The sector faces a 30-35% shortage. Efficient utilization of available resources is critical to reducing production costs without burdening consumers.

Natural vs. Synthetic Products: Dr. Sodhi stressed the need to educate consumers about the value of natural dairy products, which offer essential nutrients at a quarter of the cost of plant-based alternatives-many of which contain synthetic additives.

Export Potential: With rising milk production, India must go beyond its domestic market. Current dairy exports stand at USD 275 million, primarily comprising ghee and butter (60%), skimmed milk powder (27%), and paneer. Export destinations include the USA, UAE, neighbouring countries, and Singapore. In Order to manage the growing supply and ensure fair farmer pricing, India should aim to export 10-12% of its milk production, following global examples such as New Zealand (95%) and USA (35%). Challenges also include export restrictions to major markets like China and Russia, and the need to enhance quality, packaging, and compliance with international protocols.

Dr. Sodhi expressed gratitude to all stakeholders-research institutions, cooperatives, private players, and government bodies-for their contributions in areas such as product innovation, vaccination, breeding, and genetic improvement. Their sustained efforts have enabled India to retain its top position in global milk production.

Dr. Bimlesh Mann, ADG (E.P. & H.S.), ICAR addressed the gathering as the Special Guest on the occasion. She highlighted the theme of the World Milk Day 2025 i.e. "Let's Celebrate with the Power of Dairy." Dairy

plays a vital role in sustainable food systems through its contributions to nutrition, environment, economy, and culture. Nutritionally, dairy provides high-quality protein and bioavailable nutrients such as calcium, vitamin B12, iodine, magnesium, and potassium, and is linked to a reduced risk of osteoporosis, cardiovascular disease, type 2 diabetes, and colorectal cancer. Its unique food matrix enhances health benefits beyond individual nutrients. According to the ICMR-NIN 2024 guidelines, dairy intake should be 250-300 ml for children, 300-400 ml for adolescents, 300 ml for adults, 500 ml for pregnant women, 500-600 ml for lactating mothers, and 400-500 ml for the elderly. Dairy options include milk, curd, paneer, and buttermilk, with preference for lowfat, unsweetened, and pasteurized forms. Protein requirements should ideally be met through natural food sources, and protein supplements are not recommended for the general population unless prescribed by a healthcare professional.

Environmentally, innovations like improved feed and manure management reduce emissions, while dairy supports circular agriculture by utilizing inedible biomass and promoting soil health, biodiversity, and carbon sequestration. Economically, dairy is a critical source of livelihood for millions, especially in rural and low-income areas, and supports food security. Culturally, dairy is deeply rooted in traditional diets and food practices, and replacing it may risk disrupting dietary diversity and heritage.

Dr. Mann concluded by recognizing the critical role of dairy not only in livelihood and nutritional security but also in health security.

Dr. S.K. Bhalla, Ex-COO, Mother Dairy, in his address as the Guest of Honour, placed strong emphasis on the importance of ethics in the industry. He highlighted a concerning trend wherein the quality of products is being compromised in an effort to control prices.

Dr. Bhalla firmly stated that analog products should not be marketed or sold as dairy. He pointed out the lack of proper representation for the dairy sector in regulatory and industry bodies such as the FSSAI (Food Safety and Standards Authority of India) and CII (Confederation of Indian Industry). He stressed the need for proactive efforts to ensure that the dairy industry's voice is heard in these important forums.

In this context, Dr. Bhalla requested Dr. Sodhi to take up the matter with FSSAI and CII to seek appropriate representation and action. Furthermore, he advocated for greater public awareness and education about analog products, which are often misleadingly sold under the guise of genuine dairy item.

Dr. Raghavendra Bhatta, DDG (Animal Science), ICAR,

addressed the gathering as Chief Guest and termed the dairy sector as a sunrise sector, contributing 30% to agriculture GDP and 5% to national GDP. Valued at Rs.12 lakh crore, the industry is poised to touch Rs.40 lakh crore by 2047. He attributed this growth to institutional support and the successful Anand Pattern cooperative model. Emphasizing the need to boost exports amidst rising milk production, Dr. Bhatta stressed achieving FMD-free status by 2030 and declaring disease-free zones to enable global trade. He highlighted innovations like GauChip and MaheshChip, developed under the Rashtriya Gokul Mission, to boost genetic improvement and self-reliance. He also informed that the LSD vaccine would be available within three months. Addressing sectoral challenges such as high processing costs, inadequate feed and fodder, and insufficient infrastructure, Dr. Bhatta recommended conserving indigenous breeds, raising R&D funding by 1%, offering low-cost Al services, increasing procurement prices, lowering GST on dairy products, expanding the cold chain, and restructuring dairy schemes with clear, time-bound targets.

Shri Pankaj Kumar Sharma, Ex-Chief Risk Officer of Mother Dairy, delivered a Special address on the integration of Environmental, Social, and Governance (ESG) compliance in the Indian dairy sector. Emphasizing its strategic value, he outlined how ESG alignment can help Indian exporters navigate global challenges, seize emerging opportunities, and enhance market access. He stressed the importance of adhering to international standards such as ISO 22000 (Food Safety), ISO 14001 (Environmental Management), and Codex Alimentarius guidelines. Quality assurance through regular contaminant testing, organic certifications, and robust regulatory documentation is vital. Additionally, strict compliance with labelling and packaging norms of importing countries was underscored. Shri Sharma highlighted growing global focus on the Dairy Sustainability Framework (DSF), which monitors key sustainability metrics like animal care, greenhouse gas emissions, biodiversity, rural economy, and water qualitynow covering 30% of global milk production. He concluded by urging the Indian dairy industry to adopt ESG and sustainability frameworks not just as compliance tools, but as essential strategies for longterm global success.

All dignitaries including the Chief Guest Dr. Raghavendra Bhatta; Dr. Bimlesh Mann; Dr. S.K. Bhalla and Shri Pankaj Kumar Sharma were felicitated with a shawl and a memento on the occasion.

During the open session, Shri I.K. Narang, Former Assistant Commissioner (DD), raised concerns regarding

milk adulteration, emphasizing that the IDA should take a proactive role in addressing the issue. His concern was endorsed by Shri V.K. Tewari.

Shri Ram Chandra Choudhary, Chairman, Ajmer Milk Union, called for a minimum 12-year sentence for milk adulteration and urged that the dairy sector be granted industry or agriculture status. He advocated for a National Milk Grid, support price for dairy products, free sex-sorted semen for farmers, loans @ 4% like agriculture farmer, and removal of 28% GST on molasses. He also recommended allocating 5% of the Association's budget for consumer awareness campaigns.

The event concluded with a Vote of Thanks delivered by the Secretary General of IDA.

Three technical sessions were held wherein renowned experts delivered insightful talks on diverse aspects of dairying:



Dr. Sahoo emphasized the therapeutic potential of non-bovine milk (such as goat and camel milk), advocating for its wider use as a health-promoting alternative in nutraceutical and functional food sectors.



Milk has been known as nature's most complete food for millennia, playing currently an important role in the diet of over 6 billion people in the world. Milk and Dairy products are nutrient-dense foods, supplying energy and high-quality protein with a range of essential micronutrients (especially calcium, magnesium, potassium, zinc, and phosphorus) in an easily absorbed form. Dairy products are rich in nutrients that are essential for good bone health, including calcium, protein, vitamin D, potassium, and phosphorus. Calcium also has been shown to be beneficial in reducing cholesterol absorption, and in controlling body weight and blood pressure.

Dr. Parveen Kamboj, former Principal Scientist and Member, IDA- HSC welcomed all guests, participants, students and staffs of the school and gave the introductory remarks on the significance of Word Milk Day and role of milk and milk products in life.
